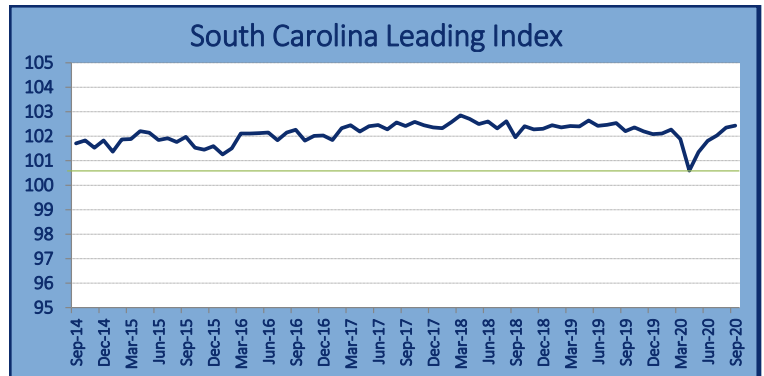




ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose 0.08 points last month, ending with a value (following revisions) of 102.43.

SCLI metrics were mixed in September. Unemployment claims were 26.4 percent lower than in August. The number of issued housing permits increased 0.2 percent month-over-month and valuation for the permits fell 1.9 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours fell 0.2 percent. The Dow Jones Composite Average was down 1.0 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index increased in August (following revisions) to 107.2. This is the fifth consecutive month with a gain. Index readings above 100 forecast economic expansion, though the pace of growth seems to be slowing as 2020 enters its final months.

Non-Seasonally Adjusted Wage and Salary Employment

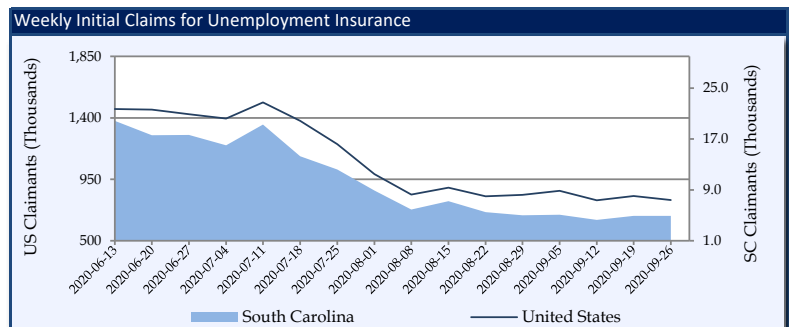
South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 19,200 net jobs to 2,115,200 in September, a 0.9 percent increase from revised August numbers but 2.8 percent lower than one year ago. Many sectors reported job gains for the month, including Government (8,100); Other Services (5,500); Professional and Business Services (4,300); Manufacturing (3,300); Educational and Health Services (2,700); and Information (100). Sectors reporting net losses were Leisure and Hospitality (-2,900); Finance (-600); Trade, Transportation and Utilities (-500); and Natural Resources and Mining (-100). Construction was flat. Compared to one year ago, the state economy lost 61,100 net nonfarm jobs.

Weekly Unemployment Claims

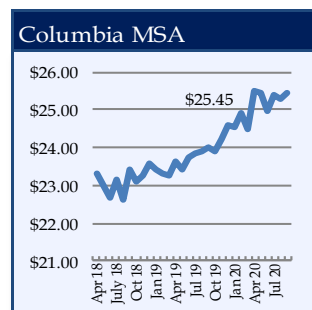
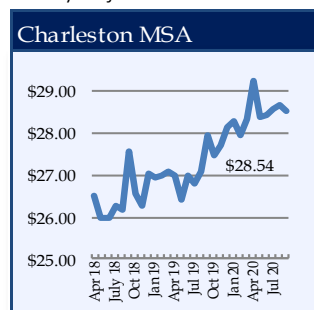
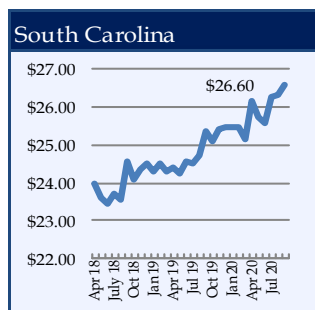
The average number of initial reported claims for unemployment insurance in the state decreased in September. The average for the month was 4,789 weekly initial claims, a 26.4 percent improvement month-over-month.

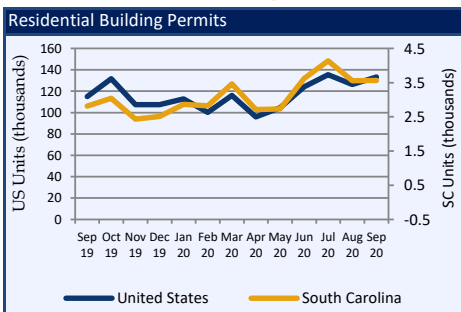
Real Estate & Business Activity

In September, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 0.2 percent to 3,562. This figure was up 26.5 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits fell 1.9 percent month-over-month but was 37.5 percent higher than one year ago. Total closings were up 1.4 percent compared to August, while the median sales price was up 0.8 percent. Foreclosure activity fell 68.8 percent from September 2019. Total closings rose in half of the six MSAs, with Florence reporting the strongest gain (15.9 percent). Median sales price rose in three of the MSAs month-over-month as well, with Florence again leading at 6.1 percent.

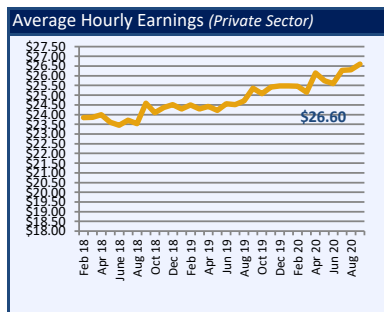

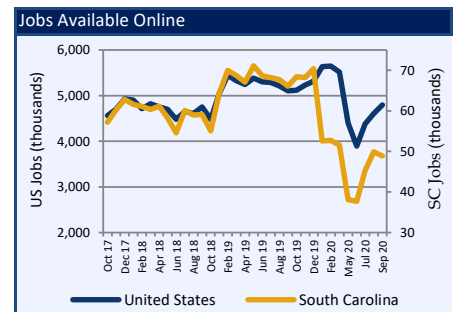

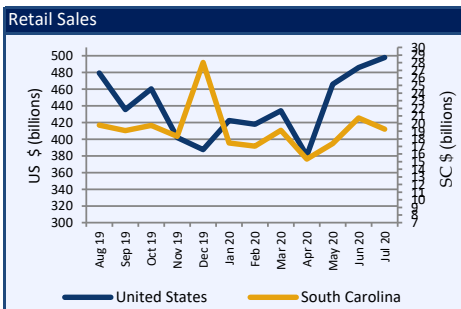

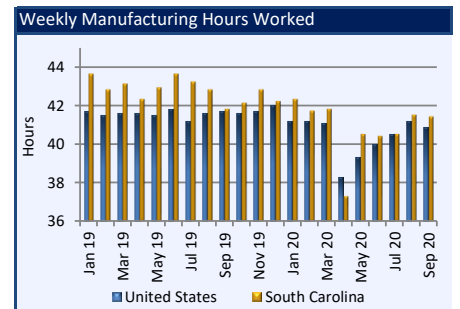

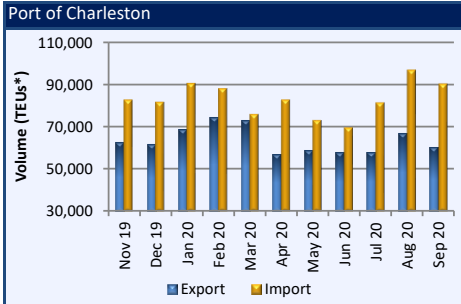

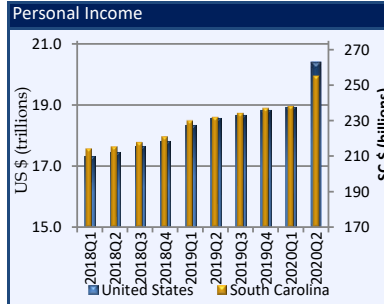

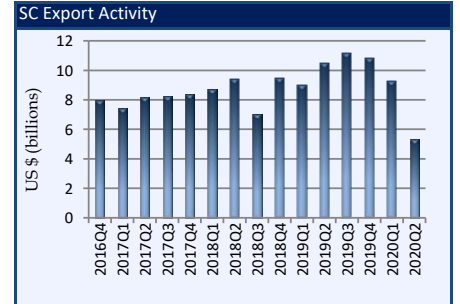
Income and Output
