

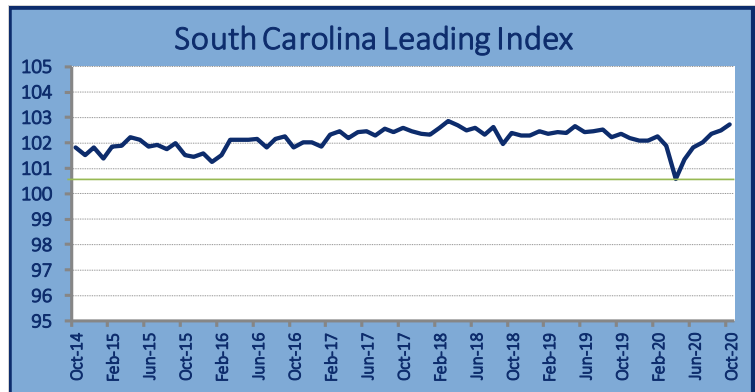

ECONOMIC OUTLOOK

The South Carolina Leading Index (SCLI) rose 0.32 points last month, ending with a value (following revisions) of 102.72.

SCLI metrics showed strong improvement in October. Unemployment claims were 14.8 percent lower than in September. The number of issued housing permits increased 15.0 percent month-over-month and valuation for the permits rose 9.4 percent. Average weekly manufacturing hours rose 0.7 percent. The lone negative, the Dow Jones Composite Average, was down 2.1 percent.

The Conference Board's national Leading Economic Index increased in October to 108.2. This is the sixth consecutive month with a gain. Index readings above 100 forecast economic expansion, though the pace of growth seems to be slowing in the final months of 2020.

Non-Seasonally Adjusted Wage and Salary Employment

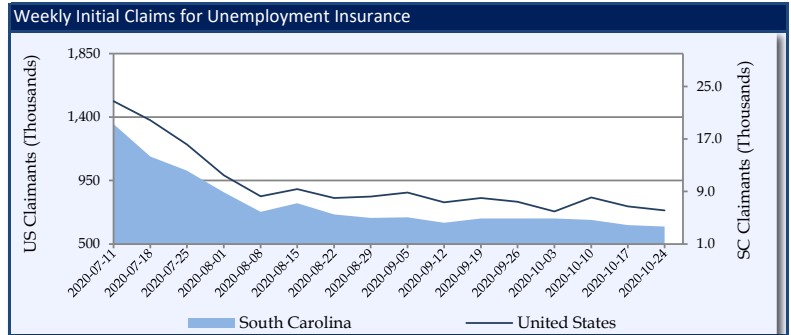
South Carolina's total non-seasonally adjusted nonfarm employment rose by 20,100 net jobs to 2,128,400 in October, a 1.0 percent increase from revised September numbers but 2.8 percent lower than one year ago. Most sectors reported job gains for the month, including Educational and Health Services (4,800); Leisure and Hospitality (4,800); Professional and Business Services (4,300); Government (3,100); Construction (2,000); Finance (600); Trade, Transportation and Utilities (500); Manufacturing (200); and Natural Resources and Mining (100). Sectors reporting net losses were Information (-200); and Other Services (-100). Compared to one year ago, the state economy lost 61,400 net nonfarm jobs.

Weekly Unemployment Claims

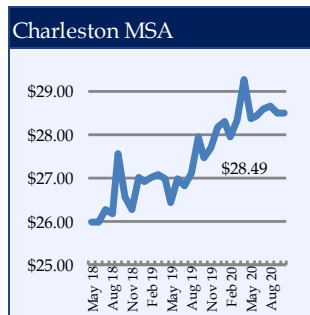
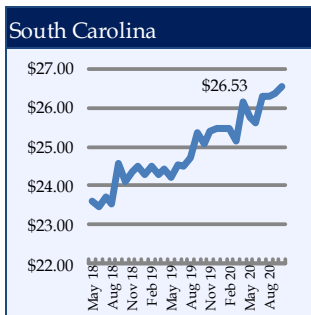
The average number of initial reported claims for unemployment insurance in the state decreased in October. The average for the month was 4,080 weekly initial claims, a 14.8 percent improvement month-over-month.

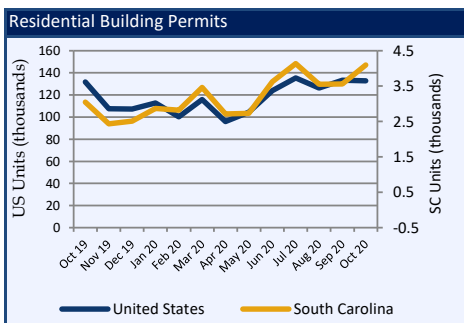
Real Estate & Business Activity

In October, the number of building permits issued in South Carolina for new residential construction rose 15.0 percent to 4,098. This figure was up 34.6 percent from one year ago. Valuation for the permits rose 9.4 percent month-over-month and was 29.8 percent higher than one year ago. Total closings were up 1.4 percent compared to September, while the median sales price was up 0.6 percent. Foreclosure activity fell 66.5 percent from September 2019. Total closings rose in half of the six MSAs, with Myrtle Beach reporting the strongest gain (4.2 percent). Median sales price fell in four of the MSAs month-over-month, with Myrtle Beach at the bottom this time, dropping 2.6 percent.

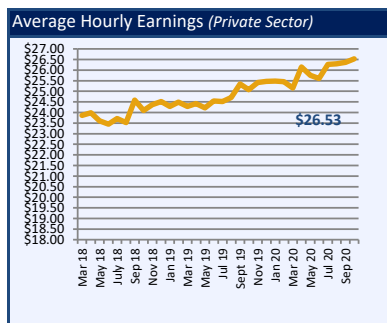

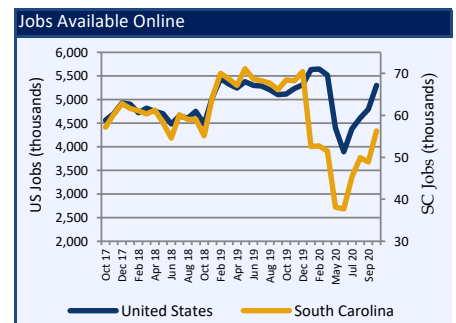

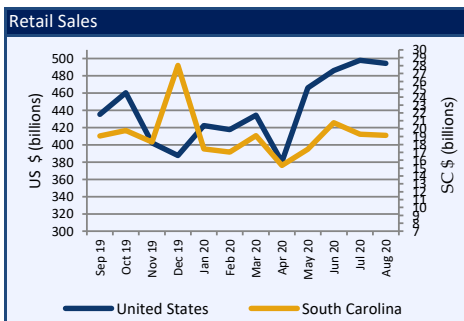

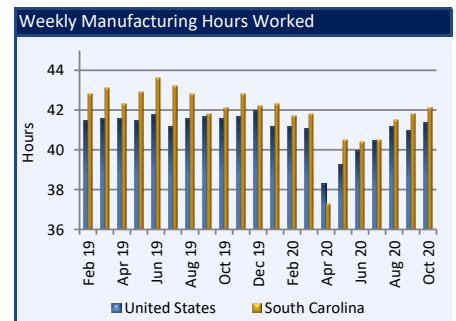

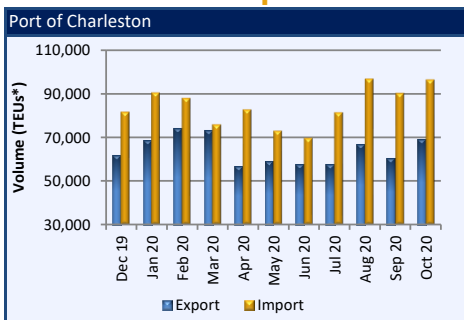

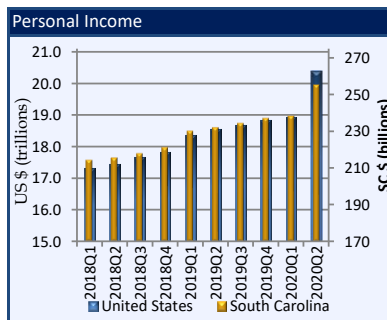

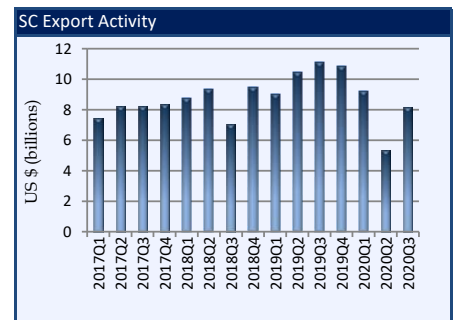
Income and Output
